# Third Global Dialogue on Ocean Accounting: Towards an Agenda for Action

### Background Information

Ocean accounts organise social, economic and environmental information to enable coherent measurement and management of progress towards sustainable ocean development, in line with the Sustainable Development Goals and other relevant national, regional and global commitments.

The [Global Ocean Accounts Partnership \(GOAP\)](#) was established to enable countries and other stakeholders to go beyond GDP to effectively measure and manage progress towards ocean sustainable development. GOAP aims to support at least 30 countries by 2030 to build complete sequences of national ocean accounts and co-create knowledge products that support the development of globally accepted and standardised ocean accounting practices by 2023. Co-Chaired by UNESCAP and Fisheries and Oceans Canada, GOAP brings together governments, international organizations, and research institutions to build a global community of practice for ocean accounting.

Since its founding in 2019, GOAP has hosted two Global Dialogues on Ocean Accounting. The inaugural Dialogue in [2019](#) was co-hosted by the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (UNESCAP) and the University of New South Wales (UNSW) and was attended by representatives from 17 governments and other stakeholders. The second Dialogue in [2021](#) was hosted by Fisheries and Oceans Canada and was attended by representatives from 27 governments and stakeholders from over 60 countries. [The Third Global Dialogue on Ocean Accounting](#) will be held on Wednesday, March 30, 2022, and is co-hosted by the Indonesian Ministry of Marine Affairs and Fisheries (MMAF) and UK Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA). This year's Dialogue builds on the previous two editions to reflect on the accelerating progress of ocean accounting globally and discuss practical opportunities for collaboration and action. Discussions will lay the foundation for the creation of an agenda for action to further ocean accounting efforts globally, as well as strengthen efforts to go beyond GDP to measure and manage progress towards sustainable development of the ocean.

### Objectives of the Dialogue

This year's Dialogue aims to bring together governments, international organisations, research institutions, and other stakeholders to:

- Reflect on the accelerated progress of ocean accounting to discuss the state of ocean accounting globally in 2022.
- Explore country experiences with initiating, implementing and using ocean accounts and share lessons learned, best practices and challenges.
- Showcase what ocean accounts can deliver for different institutions as a foundation of more sustainable decision-making.
- Discuss potential elements of an agenda for action to further ocean accounting efforts globally.
- Identify needs and options for follow-up events in 2022 to continue the development of the agenda for action, including its implementation.
